From the Desk of Robert Palmer, Commission Chair

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There is great excitement about the coming Texas Historical Marker honoring Jimmie Kolp. She was a Wichita County legend, friend to many famous people, uniquely talented for a woman of her time, sophisticated, and the adjectives describing her go on and on. She was more than all that to the people of the little oil field town of Electra, Texas. It is an amazing story, how these hard working people viewed her. They all knew who she was, from the youngest to the oldest.

I vividly recall being on the playground of Thompson Ward Elementary watching an airplane fly over. Immediately, there was great discussion about, "Was that Jimmie Kolp's airplane?" Those students knew. Many had ridden with their parents to her runway and hangar west of Electra to watch "Fly Ins." She would invite her flying friends to fly to her airport, ride to her house in provided Cadillacs, and enjoy a time of stories and refreshments. She was a well known hostess. Some locals were hired to serve the guests and they told all their friends about what it was like. The students knew her Cessna airplane. Many older residents remembered her bi-wing airplane her husband had bought her early in their marriage. Local historians actually found the plane several years ago in Louisiana and talked about buying it until they found out the price was in excess of a half a million dollars. I never talked to anyone who saw the Rolls Royce her husband supposedly bought her on their wedding day.

Her husband was considerably older than her and wealthy. He originally was manager of the Waggoner Refinery west of Electra. He had added to his wealth by buying and selling oil properties, a common way to get very wealthy at that time. Her father was a doctor and she did not grow up worried about money. Her story will be well told at the marker dedication, but how did the people who saw her every day view her?

I actually interviewed the young gentleman who was involved in the famous water bottle story. During the height of the Depression, on a very hot day, she called the local supermarket, Hogles Modern Market. She told the owner Lee Hogle she wanted five, five gallon bottles of drinking water delivered to her house, the two story stucco mansion built for Electra Waggoner. This was at a time when Electra's water came from the small lake on China Creek, near Punkin Center. The watershed was the oil fields northwest of Electra. Mr. Hogle told the young high school student working at his store to take those bottles to Mrs. Kolp and put the water wherever she wanted it. When he arrived, she told him to take it upstairs and put it in the bathtub. He was picturing her dipping the water out of the tub, when she said, "I'm not about to take a bath in the water that's coming through these pipes."

Donald Givens, a well known Electra resident and lifelong oil field employee, told me once that, if he ever heard someone criticizing Mrs. Kolp, he would set them straight. After the death of her husband, she had her office on the second floor of The Bank. the former headquarters for the Texas Company. She called Donald one day and asked why he had never bought the open land next to his house. He replied he couldn't afford it. She asked him, "Well, what can you afford?" He replied, "Actually, no more than ten dollars a month." She said, "Come see me." When he went, they signed a note. At that time, it was custom to make note payments in person. The first of every month, he went to her office and made the payment. She always asked him about his family.

She once had a friend who owned a Piper Cub to come to her airport. She wanted Electra people to experience flying. For five dollars he would take you up, fly over the Waggoner Whiteface Ranch, then over Lake Diversion, then over the city of Electra. I was twelve years old and yes, I took a flight.

In her years, she lived in a very modern house on the north end of Crescent Street, a two block long street. I was a newly married, young teacher who lived on the far end of South Crescent. Many times, when I left at 6:00 am to drive my school bus route, I would meet her where North and South Crescent streets met. She would be in her turquoise Cadillac, with her ever present long cigarette holder in her had. She always waved!





Program: Hanaba Welch gave an amusing presentation on the history of Doan's Crossing and the annual May Day Picnic. As the cattle route shifted from the Chisholm Trail to the Western Train, Jonathan Doan's trading post, located on the Red River, was the last place cowboys could get supplies and mail before crossing into Indian Territory and driving the cattle to northern markets. The Doan family, considered to be the first settlers in Wilbarger County, came from Ohio where May Day was celebrated to bid farewell to Winter and welcome Spring. The Texas picnic was held on the first Saturday of May in 1894. After a meager meal of sardines and crackers, the Doan family headed over the hill to celebrate. The picnic is the oldest continuing event in the state of Texas and this year will mark the 141st outing. All are welcome.
